# *Seaside Police Department*



## *Chief's Message*

2012 showed a reduction of crime in both Part I and Part II crime until December when increases in burglary and thefts caused Part I Offenses to increase slightly. We continued our ongoing planning and partnerships with the Seaside Downtown Development Association and Seaside Chamber of Commerce leading to another successful Spring Break, 4<sup>th</sup> of July, Beach Volleyball, and Hood To Coast. The department also provided security for the Miss Oregon Pageant including a parade. The 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade was bigger than ever which led to the development of a parade operational plan implemented during the Christmas Parade. Our two car shows, annual Bike Fest motorcycle show and a host of other activities and events were successfully held in Seaside.

Part I offenses were remaining steady until the month of December when Burglaries and Thefts increased significantly which led to an annual increase of two percent (2%). The only other area showing an increase was in Motor Vehicle Theft which went from 14 to 15. All other areas showed reductions most significantly Rape (3 to 0), Robbery (7 to 5) and Assaults (9 to 2). Part I offenses over the past ten years shows a four percent (-4%) reduction. Part II offenses also saw a decrease of eighteen (-18%) percent, including reductions in Simple Assault (74 to 41), Forgery/Counterfeit (23 to 9), Fraud (40 to 22) , and Liquor Laws (143 to 69). The most significant increase in Part II offenses was in Runaway (5 to 26). Our Part I Crimes clearance rate was twenty-nine percent (29%) and our Part II Crimes clearance rate was sixty-nine (69%) percent. The ten year look at Part II offenses shows a ten percent (-10%) reduction.

While underage drinking enforcement of liquor laws remains a department priority the numbers this year dropped significantly indicating some are getting the message while others are choosing to drink elsewhere. Officers cited fifty-five (55) minors for possession or consumption of alcohol. They also arrested eight (8) people for furnishing alcohol to minors and conducted one decoy operation through local alcohol outlets to ensure compliance in asking for the proper identification.

In 2012, the Seaside Police Department sponsored the sixth annual South County Citizen's Police Academy. Working with Gearhart, Cannon Beach, and the Clatsop County Sheriffs Office, we provided training to citizens interested in law enforcement in Clatsop County.

We also held our fifth annual Child Safety Fair and we continue to partner with Safe Kids North Coast to give kids the opportunity to learn about bicycle safety, water safety, pedestrian safety, safety around power lines, fire safety, and provided a child safety seat clinic.

August saw our seventh annual National Night Out in Broadway and Cartwright Parks. The Seaside Chamber of Commerce, Seaside Kiwanis, Rotary Club of Seaside, and Sunset Empire Parks & Recreation continued their partnership with us in sponsoring food, activities and prizes for this community event. The community participation seems to increase every year as people enjoy an old fashioned picnic, conversation and learning more about protecting themselves and their families.

I am proud of all the men and women who serve Seaside. They are excellent representatives of the Seaside Police Department. Throughout 2012 they worked hard keeping our community safe. Their continued hard work reducing crime is a direct reflection of their ongoing dedication and commitment to our community.

2013 is the year we will ask the community for feedback through the use of a Community Survey. This along with feedback from within our department will allow us to update our Strategic Plan. We continue our work within the agency in developing clear Policies and Procedures working toward being recognized as an Oregon Accredited agency.

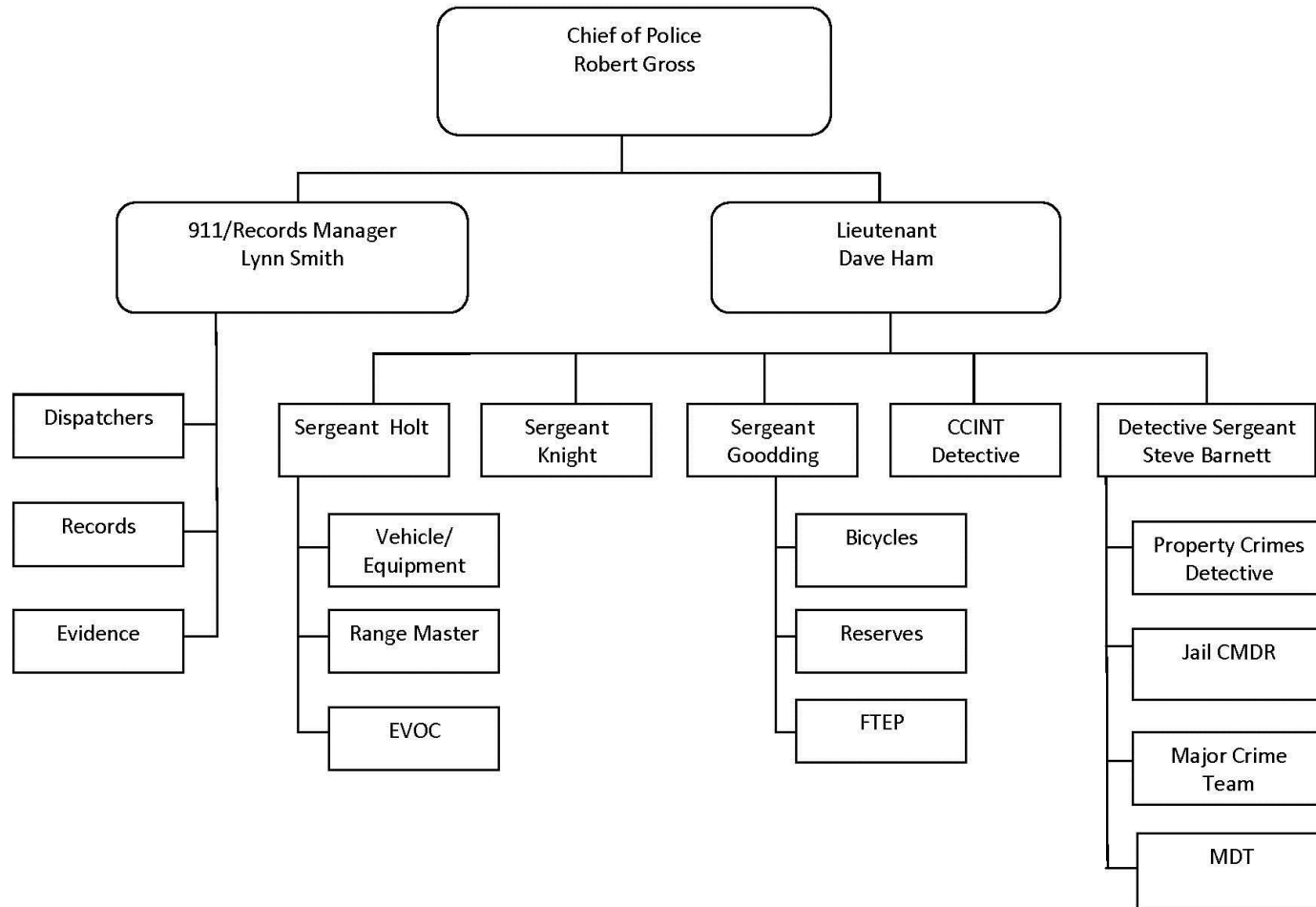

# *Patrol Division*



The Seaside Police Department has 19 full time Police Officers and 1 Community Service Officer Position. In addition to these full time positions, Seaside Police Department has a Reserve Police Officer program with the ability to employ several reserves to assist in patrol responsibilities.

In 2012 we had two of our employees leave for other agencies, one of these being a sergeant who left for a Chief of Police position with another local agency. These vacancies led to a hiring process where we hired Officer Grant Shimer and Officer David Davidson. As we had a vacant sergeant position open we also conducted a promotional process and that position is now filled by Sgt. Guy Knight.

2012 also introduced a new look to our patrol officer uniforms. The previous lighter blue uniforms had been in service for many years and due to that uniform being discontinued by the manufacturer, we had to make a change in our look. We took this opportunity to update our department patch that had been in service since the mid 1990's. The new patch was designed by our very own Cpl. Baugher.



Training our officers is an ongoing process that involves a combination of in house and external courses. In 2008 the department started an in house “mini academy”, which has been an annual training event since then. Planning for the 2013 mini academy is currently underway. This mini academy allows our officers to gain locally provided updated training in various aspects of law enforcement. Some of the topics are state mandated annual training topics. Many of the training topics conducted throughout the year and during the mini academy are instructed or presented by SPD instructor certified officers or by local professionals.

The City of Seaside hosted several annual events that Seaside Police Department prepares for large crowds. Events requiring extra police presence and preparation included Spring Break, Memorial Day Weekend, 4<sup>th</sup> of July, Volleyball Tournament and Hood to Coast. These events create unique population floods into our city, increasing our need for patrol officers to deal with the anticipated call volume and crowd control situations. We meet the need for extra patrol officers by extending the hours of the on duty officers and scheduling officers who are on normal scheduled days off to work.

Our personnel continue to participate in child safety programs. With financial assistance from community groups and other donations we are able to keep a stock of bicycle helmets and provide them to needy families. Car seat clinics are events that our officers are involved in with Safe Kids, Inc. These clinics help teach parents the proper installation and use of child restraint systems. During these clinics, car seats are offered to those who are in need of them at a very low cost or if the car seat that arrived to be inspected is not safe to use. We have personnel who often make appearances within the schools for informal visits or as invited guests to speak. The Lunch Buddy program has Chief Gross as a weekly visitor to the elementary school. We also assist a local organization with delivering backpacks full of food for needy children so that they have something to eat over the weekend when the school lunch program is not provided.

Several officers were involved with National Night Out, which was introduced to our community in 2006. During National Night Out the public is invited to two separate park locations for a Bar-B-Q and games for the kids, sponsored by the Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs here in Seaside. This event is great for getting residents out of their houses and meeting neighbors they may not know or haven't seen for quite some time. Donations by local businesses are given to help support the event and those items are given away to lucky winners in the free raffle that goes on throughout the event. In addition to the food and fun had by all during National Night Out, informational pamphlets are given out in the hopes that everyone is preparing for emergency situations.

Department members often act as guest speakers for many events, functions and organizations, usually presenting a community policing or crime prevention educational program. The 55 Alive program is a regular class that SPD personnel presents information at and answers questions on varying topics.

In 2012 we sponsored our 6<sup>th</sup> Citizens Academy where several citizens were able to participate in educational training sessions presented by many different law enforcement agencies within our county covering a variety of topics. Some of these Citizen Academy graduates continue to volunteer and assist our department on a regular basis and their help is greatly appreciated. This continues to be a popular program for the community and it involves many of our personnel to ensure the training and education to the public is professional and relevant to their needs and wants.

## *INVESTIGATIONS*

In 2012 Investigations maintained two full-time positions with Detective Sergeant Barnett and a 2<sup>nd</sup> rotating detective position, Detective Oja who has approximately 11 months remaining in his position. Detective Oja was granted a 3<sup>rd</sup> year extension based on his performance that will keep him with Investigation until the end of 2013.

2012 showed a decline in the need to activate and use of the Clatsop County Major Crimes Team. Detective Oja attends MCT meetings. Detective Sergeant Barnett and Detective Oja attend Multi Disciplinary Team meetings at the Sheriff's Department discussing crimes against children and related topics with DHS, Law Enforcement, Medical Practitioners, School Administrators, Juvenile Workers, and other people in related fields. Detective Sergeant Barnett and Detective Oja also attended trainings in the fields of Homicide, Child Abuse, Child Sex Abuse, and other related topics totaling over 100 hours.

This year Detective Oja and Detective Sergeant Barnett worked several high profile cases including a double homicide, suspicious child death, and several arsons which fostered media attention. Detective Oja continues to update his knowledge in the field of computer crimes, computer forensics, and internet investigations and has made several trips to the FBI Northwest Regional Computer Forensics Lab to perform forensic analysis on varying electronic devices including cell phones, computer hard drives, and flash memory devices.

Detective Oja continues to grow as an investigator and over the past two years now works cases independently including several high tech internet crime and computer crime cases. Detective Oja was able to procure several pieces of equipment necessary to move undercover online child pornography investigations forward. He is still seeking the \$2000 necessary to launch the program in a full capacity.

In 2012 Detective Oja also updated Seaside PD's security cameras which included the installation of a digital recording system and color/night vision cameras that are used inside and outside the police station.

Goals for 2013 include the continued growth and training of Detective Oja and to improve interagency relationships on local, state, and federal levels. Both detectives will attend the 8 hour practical training at the State Medical Examiner's office in Portland to become Deputy Medical Examiners. Detective Oja intends on attending training to become a certified defensive tactics instructor. Detective Oja is also interested in attending training and working to purchasing equipment that will allow Seaside Police to perform basic forensic analysis on technology devices without having to seek help from outside agencies.

## **CLATSOP COUNTY INTERAGENCY NARCOTICS TEAM (CCINT)**

The Clatsop County Inter-Agency Narcotics Team (CCINT) investigates illicit drug activities within Clatsop County and surrounding areas that influence drug-trafficking in this region.

The Narcotics Team is supported by the Seaside Police Department and the Clatsop County Sheriff's Office. The team pools resources from participating federal, state and local resources to investigate arrest and prosecute suspected narcotic dealers.

The following are statistics resulting from investigations conducted by the Clatsop County Interagency Narcotic Team during the year of 2012.

### **METHAMPHETAMINE:**

103.1 grams of methamphetamine seized during 25 different incident involving controlled buys and the execution of search warrants. Of the 25 incidents, nine (9) occurred within Seaside.

### **HEROIN:**

100.84 grams of heroin seized during 35 different incidents involving controlled buys and the execution of search warrants. Of the 35 different incidents, twelve (12) occurred within Seaside.

### **MARIJUANA:**

7.72 pounds of marijuana seized during 28 different incidents involving controlled buys and the execution of search warrants. Of the 28 different incidents, eight (8) occurred within Seaside.

### **COCAINE:**

10.1 grams of cocaine were seized during five (5) different incidents. None of these incidents occurred within Seaside.

### **SEARCH WARRANTS:**

59 total search warrants were executed. Of these search warrants, 28 were executed within Seaside.

### **ARREST:**

101 total custodies.

Every investigation we conduct reveals links between the cities within this county and often outside the county. Our efforts have been effective and are reflected in the drug trends from the user to the street dealer; as well the large quantity dealers supplying from outside the area. This can also be seen in the downturn of the overdose trend. Informants as well as dealers themselves have disclosed the disruption of supply and distrust among the illegal drug community has kept the supply from meeting the demand. When the supply is scarce, it is less likely for the dealers to create new addicts. Our top priority is to see to it that the upcoming generation has a lower population of drug addicts through less exposure within the community.

# EVIDENCE REPORT

The year 2012 saw a change over in personnel in the Evidence Division at the Seaside Police Department. Laura Yokoyama has moved on to a job with the Cannon Beach Police Department. She spent time training the new Evidence Technician, Chris Cole, before leaving.

She had set up an excellent system of checks and balances as well as using the new Justice records management system to track and keep accurate inventories of property and evidence. With the step by step protocols to follow, the system is very user friendly.

During 2012 we have worked closely with the DA's office, Circuit Court, Municipal Court and our own officers to purge evidence items. We send lists back and forth to get evidence dispositions on closed and dismissed cases. If the items are no longer needed we will dispose of them by destruction, transfer to propertyroom.com for auction, or sale of firearms to a licensed firearm dealer. Chief Gross has set up a storage box, resembling an old mailbox, for citizens to drop off old prescriptions and drugs for destruction. These are boxed up, after removing the labels, and go to Marion County with our confiscated drugs and paraphernalia for incineration.

Public Works is in the process of building additional storage racks for long term storage in our new Evidence/Property building. We also acquired a dehumidifier to help take the moisture out of the air and prevent any mold from growing on the evidence.

We continue to use the auctioning services of propertyroom.com to sell off bikes, crab pots, baby carriages, cell phones, camping gear, skateboards, abandoned items and any forfeited evidence items. The last truck picked up in January 2013, with 49 separate items for resell, bringing revenue to the police department. Revenue returned in 2012 was \$760.98.

In 2012 ammunition and magazines given to the Range Master for disposal included 8 different lots filling up two medium sized boxes. There are currently 16 firearms ready for forfeiture sale.

In 2012 there were 5,270 items brought to Seaside Police Department as Evidence, Found Property, Recovered Stolen Property or Damaged Items. There are items from 63 case files that have been destroyed, sealed in a Destruct Box or waiting for packaging for a trip to the incinerator in Marion County.

My goals for 2013:

- to get additional training in handling evidence and property items;
- to reduce the number of evidence items still in storage from 2005;
- and to organize items of long term/nearly permanent status so there will be room for future property.

## COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION

Seaside's Dispatch Center is budgeted for a staff of eight. We not only perform the tasks of 9-1-1 and police/fire dispatch, but also agency receptionist, records and evidence management. Our service population is approximately 30,000 people. We primarily dispatch for:

- Seaside, Gearhart, Cannon Beach and Hamlet Fire Departments
- Seaside, Gearhart, and Cannon Beach Police Departments

As necessary, we dispatch for Oregon State Police, Clatsop County Sheriff's Office, State Forestry and U.S. Coast Guard.

2012 Statistics:

- We answered 7,175 9-1-1 calls, an increase of 8% over last year. 37,986 non-emergency telephone calls were answered, a decrease of 4% from last year. Since 2007 non-emergency calls have consistently declined.
- We dispatched 9,476 police related calls (an increase of 4% from last year) and 1,644 fire/medical related calls (an increase of 10% from last year).
- Our receipt of call to dispatch time for fire averages at 49 seconds.
- Our receipt of call to dispatch time for police averages at 1.58 minutes.
- Dispatch and other support staff received 326 hours of continuing education.

2012 accomplishments include:

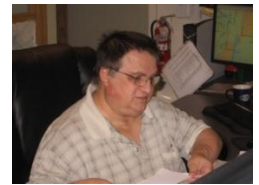
- Converting our emergency radio systems from wideband to narrowband to be in compliance with FCC standards.
- Upgrading our building lighting systems via the Energy Trust Incentive Program
- Participated in a tsunami debris exercise with multiple agencies within Clatsop County
- Replaced the 2011 dispatch vacancy with Jennifer in June.
- Began recruitment to replace a November vacancy. First round of recruitment unsuccessful.

2013 goals include:

- Improvements to radio equipment, inclusive of: Tillamook Head fire cabling and antenna replacement, reinstatement of radio voting system for City of Seaside, and replace backup power equipment to Tillamook Head.
- Complete recruitment to add another full-time dispatcher
- Flooring improvements to Dispatch Center



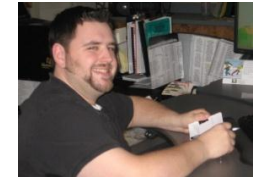

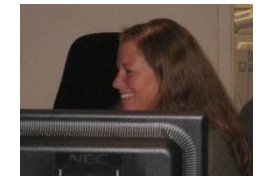

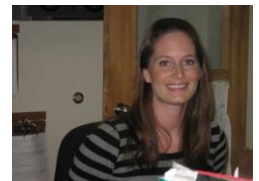

## Community Service

Community service is not the exclusive domain of the Community Service Officer and is in fact the responsibility of all Police officers and City employees. As the CSO, I would like to thank the other City employees and volunteers for their support and for the time and effort they put in to assist with my numerous requests for help, without which would make the job nearly impossible.

Code Enforcement requires numerous contacts, repeated documentation, and at times, extensive research to locate responsible parties who are then given multiple chances to abate the problem. From the public's point-of-view it may seem as if nothing is being done while in fact there is a lot of imperceptible activity taking place. I encourage follow-up contacts with the Code Enforcement Officer as well as patience, as the issue may be foremost to the reporting party but one of dozens being addressed at the time. As the elements involved in Code Enforcement are better understood, they are pursued to a greater level which takes more time.

Parking issues can be very volatile. The CSO understands that reducing parking spaces has put a strain on adequate parking in several areas of the City. In addition, there are areas with inadequate, missing, and easily misinterpreted signage and control devices. There is also the uninformed person who has previously gotten away with a violation and therefore continues to repeat the behavior or who willfully ignore the ordinances. The CSO attempts to contact and educate these offenders prior to issuing any citation. The CSO also communicates perceived signage inadequacies with the City's road department so that residents and visitors can readily distinguish where and when parking is allowed.

The CSO has many additional duties within the Police department organization. One of these duties includes collating information on residential and business alarms and passing on the necessary information to City Hall for fee collection. The CSO is also charged with the procuring of supplies for jail maintenance, kitchen facilities, and janitorial concerns to name a few.

The livescan fingerprint machines constant use confirms its value as the Seaside Police Department remains one of a few certified fingerprint locations in the Northwest region, offering non-criminal fingerprints to the general public. Many of the applicants are required to submit fingerprints as part of a background check for employment purposes. A majority of these applicants are either applying for or currently working for agencies such as Medix, DHS, law enforcement agencies, banks, medical facilities, foster care, schools, reality groups, lottery, etc. There were about 340 individuals printed in 2012 (approximately 100 more than the previous year). A special thanks goes to Volunteer Ken Butterfield who has been assisting with printing applicants.

As a member of Safe Kids North Coast, the CSO assisted with 4 Car Seat Clinics and 2 Safety Fairs, offering Child Safety Seat Inspections and low-cost car seats distribution (to low income families). The CSO, along with newly certified Child Safety Seat Inspectors within the department, offered individual CSS inspections at the Seaside Police Department in order to accommodate those who were unable to attend one of the county wide clinics. Safe Kids is also involved with pedestrian and water safety, helmet sports safety, Halloween safety, and many other areas pertaining to child safety. Thanks to generous

donations by a couple of Service Organizations, the Seaside Police Department was able to purchase and distributed free bicycle/multi-sport safety helmets to more than 100 youth throughout the year.

The CSO is also a member of the OSHA Safety Committee, which meets monthly to discuss potential or active hazards in the work place. Safety inspections of all City work sites are conducted quarterly. The information is disseminated to the proper administrative personnel for review and problem solving. All city employees are encouraged to report any safety deficiencies or concerns to their department representative.

The Police Department has contracted with PropertyRoom.com to pick up found property which has not been claimed. The City holds such “found” property for a minimum of 60 days. As CSO, I would like to remind citizens to maintain documentation on any and all valued property and have that information accessible in the event that the property becomes lost or stolen. I would also ask that citizens remain responsible enough to, at minimum, make a phone call to the authorities with notification of any missing valuables or property. The Police Department picks up scores of bicycles, keys, wallets, phones, cameras, etc. each year, most of which end up at auction.

Another time absorbing duty of the CSO is Animal Control within the City. This year has seen a significant drop in the number of licensed dogs countered by an increase of animal calls, unclaimed impounded dogs, and dog bites. Many of the calls have been pertaining to cats, which the City does not regulate. Most of the cat complaints have been about the property damage caused by cats or about feral type strays (adults, juveniles, and kittens) left after a move to roam the neighborhood (and reproduce). There is no adequate solution, at this time, in the city or the county for these cat issues. As for the City’s dog holding facility, it is in **desperate need of replacement or major repair.**

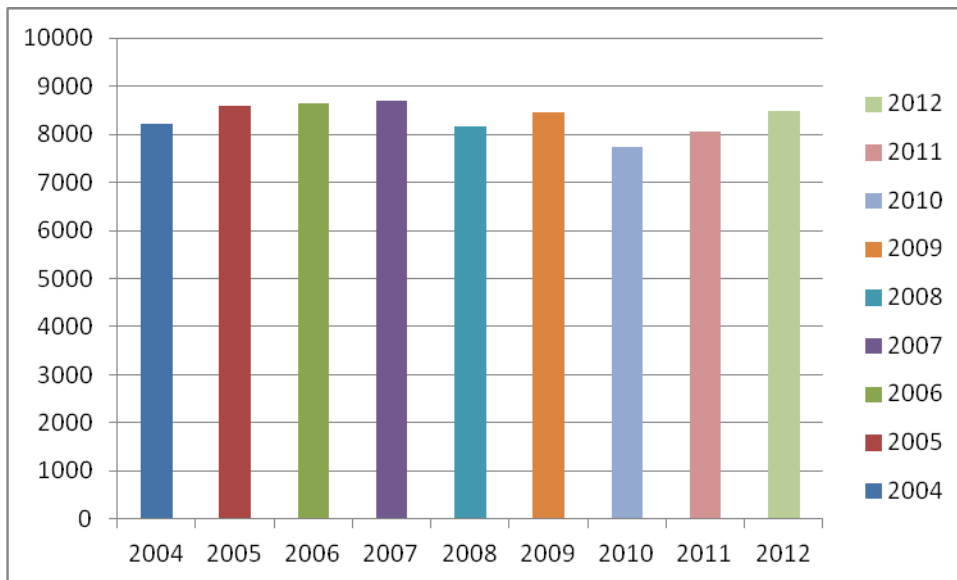

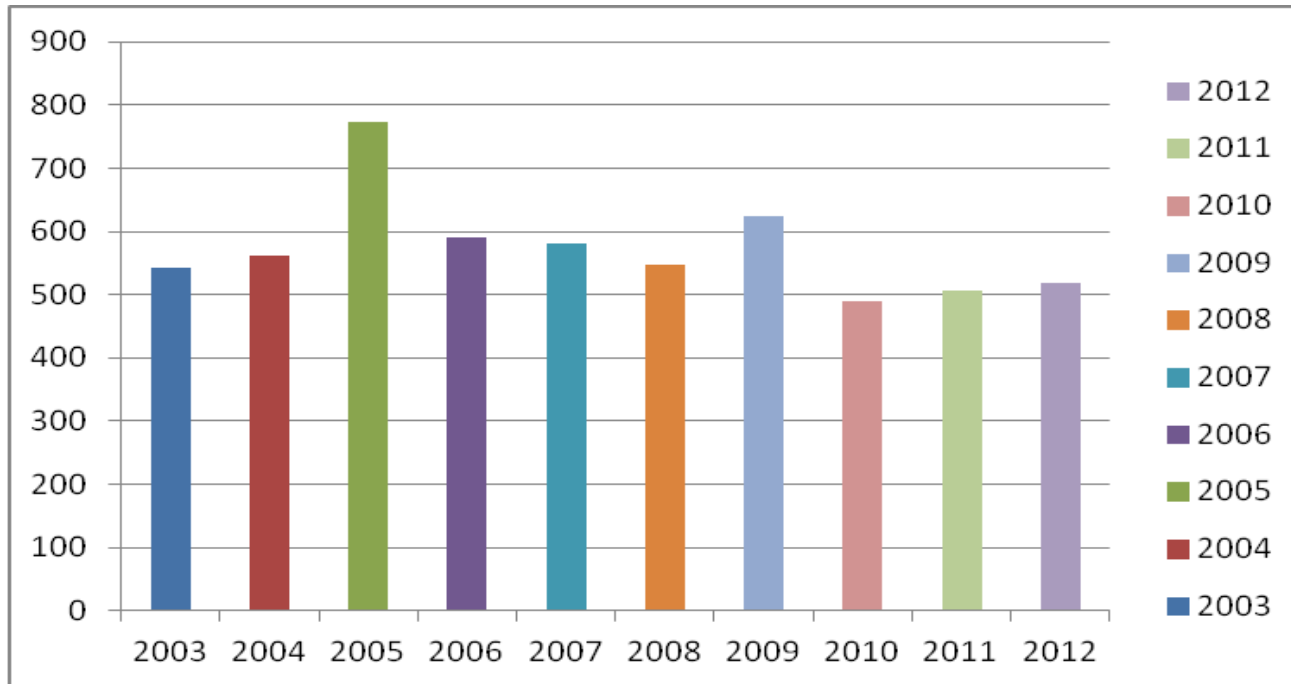

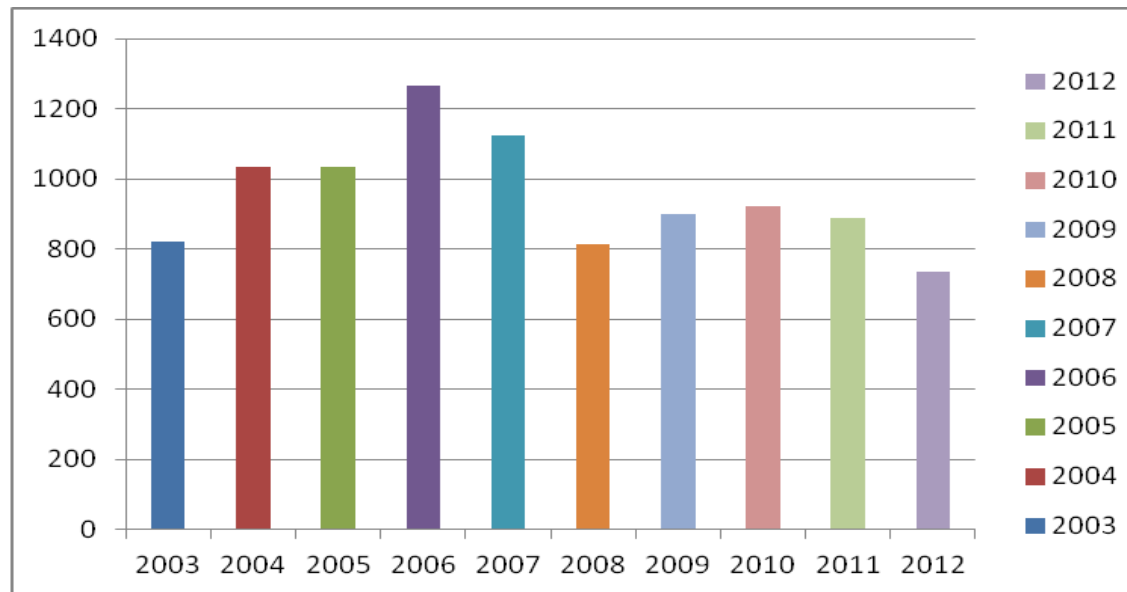

## 2012 USE OF FORCE REVIEW

There were 43 documented Use of Force incidents in 2012. (36 cases in 2011)  
This includes multiple officers at the same location.

- 41% occurred after midnight (27% 2011)
- 56% involved the use of alcohol (47% 2011) and 25% involved drugs (13% 2010) by suspects.
  - ✓ 72% were arrested (91% 2011)
  - ✓ 25% were not arrested (8% 2011)
- 95% of these cases were males. (94% 2011)
- 8% of these cases were female (8% 2011)
- 41 males & 9 females
- 49% involved the use or threatened use of the Taser (33% 2011)
  - ✓ 11% were Tased and required medical evaluation
- 44% involved the use of Physical Force (hands on) [69% 2011]
- 28% involved drawing the officers weapon (weapon displayed) [22% 2011] One discharge for an animal.
- 32% resulted in some type of injury to the suspect (minor injury requiring medical treatment) [36% 2011]
- 1% resulted in injury to an officer this year (1% 2011/)
- There was one citizen complaint involving use of force in 2012 which was investigated and determined unfounded.
