Seaside Police Department



2007 started with some unusual weather (see cover) and ended with a significant winter storm. In January, Seaside experienced a surprise snow storm dumping several inches of snow and making our area a winter wonderland for a few days. As the year was coming to a close, we again were hit with a winter storm however this one was no winter wonderland. With winds in excess of 100 m.p.h. we were without power for five days and without communications for three days. Damage throughout the community was significant and with hard work by the city and its residents, we were able to weather the storm. The resiliency of the community was outstanding.

Once again Seaside had successful community events throughout the year. With annual planning, the police department was able to ensure our four largest events; Spring Break, 4th of July, Beach Volleyball, and Hood To Coast went smoothly with minimal criminal activity. Officers also provided security for The Miss Oregon pageant and parade, 4th of July parade and activities, and the two car shows and motorcycle show that were held at the Convention Center.

Criminal activity in Seaside continued to drop in 2007 in both Part I and Part II offenses. You will see in this report that Part I offenses decreased by six percent (-6%) with decreases in Homicide, Robbery, Burglary, Thefts and Arson. We did see an increase in Motor Vehicle Thefts (15 to 20), Assaults (14 to 21), and a significant increase in Rapes (2 to 6). In looking at Part II offenses, you will see an eight percent (-8%) decrease including reductions in Forgery/Counterfeit, Fraud, Stolen Property, Vandalism, Weapons Laws, Drugs, and Curfew Violations. We were successful in clearing thirty percent (30%) of our Part I Crimes and sixty-six (66%) percent of our Part II Crimes.

Thanks to a Reduce Access to Alcohol grant, the department has been able to continue to make an impact on the illegal consumption and possession of alcohol by minors. During 2007, officers arrested two hundred seventy-two minors for possession or consumption of alcohol, a sixty percent (60%) increase over 2006. We also

arrested twenty-five people for furnishing alcohol to minors, a forty seven percent (47%) increase over last year. Because of our activity and enforcement, we will continue to receive the grant funding for 2008.

2007 saw the police department participate in three new programs. First we took the lead in developing and sponsoring a South County Citizen's Police Academy. Working with our partners in Gearhart, Cannon Beach and Clatsop County Sheriffs Office we provided training to thirteen citizens interested in learning about what we do. Three of the graduates continue to help us with various tasks as part of the Police Volunteer Program. In May we participated in a new Job Fair day identifying different jobs throughout Clatsop County that students and other adults might be interested in working towards. Juniors and Seniors from area high schools attended this one day event that has now become an annual event. Officers and dispatchers established booths where people could learn more about becoming an officer, deputy sheriff or dispatcher.

Also in 2007, the Seaside Police Department received a Bicycle Safety Grant that allowed us to conduct two Bicycle Safety Fairs that provided education, a skills course and a fun ride for participants. The grant also allowed us to continue our program of giving away free safety helmets to kids to keep them safe.

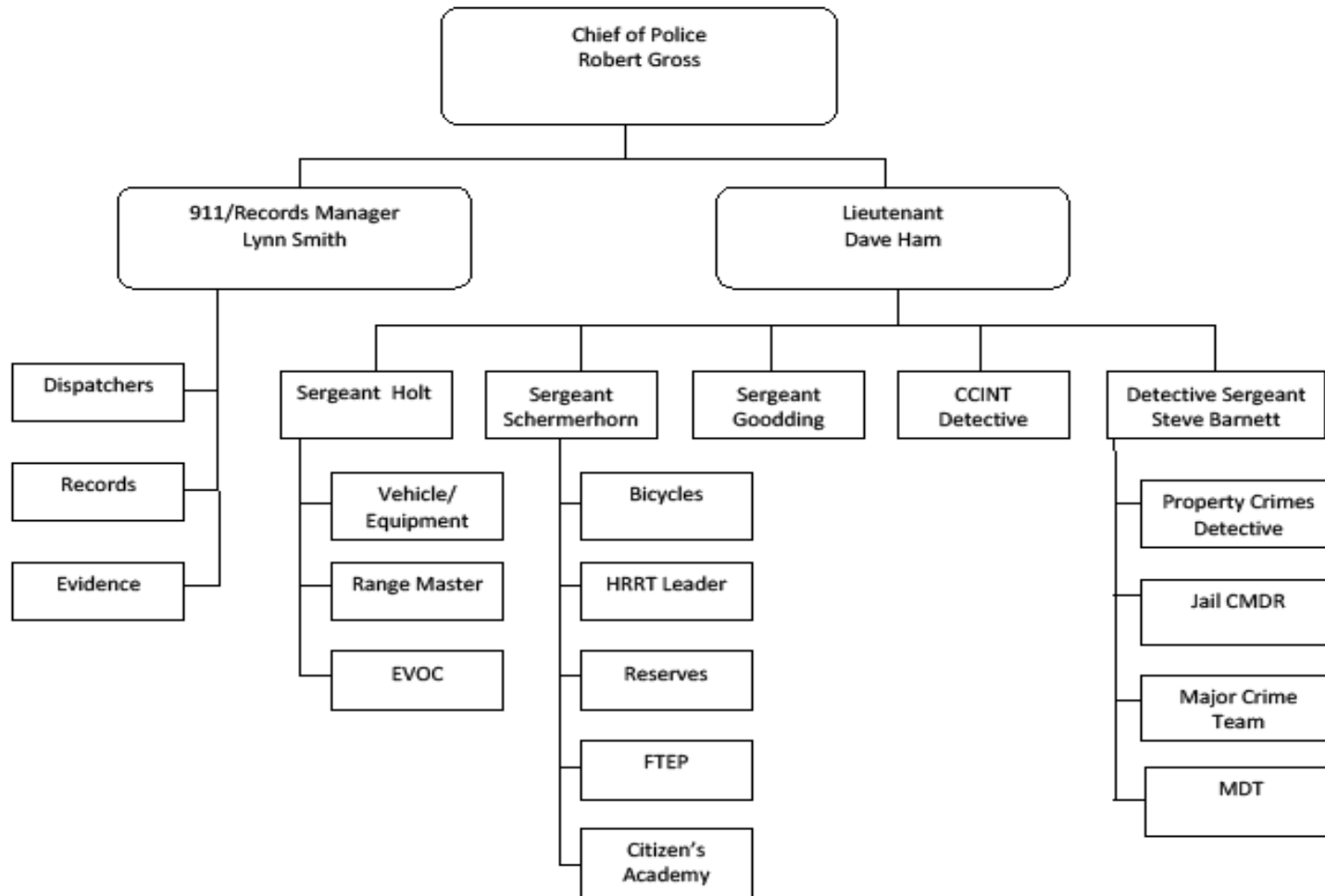
In August, we conducted our second National Night Out in Broadway Park and Cartwright Park. Despite a rainy evening, community members came together to learn about protecting themselves and their families and enjoyed an old fashioned picnic thanks to Seaside Kiwanis and Rotary Club of Seaside.

As you can see I am very proud of the men and women of the Seaside Police Department who continue to work hard to keep our community safe. Over the past two years we have seen a thirty-nine percent (39%) reduction in Part I Crimes and an eighteen percent (18%) drop in Part II Crimes. These reductions in crime are the result of the hard work and the excellent service provided by officers and dispatchers to their community. As we head into 2008, we will continue to strengthen our community partnerships through the Citizen's Academy, Merchant Alert Program, Volunteer Program, and providing services that meet the needs of our community. We remain committed to working hard to maintain the trust and confidence of our citizens and visitors.

PATROL



In the Spring of 2007, members of the public were introduced to many different aspects of a law enforcement career, giving them a better understanding of what police officers face on a daily basis. This academy will hopefully lead to a volunteer force of individuals who will be willing to assist the Seaside Police Department with many different areas of community policing programs. The Patrol Division has 20 full time Police Officers and 1 Community Service Officer position. In addition to these full time positions, Seaside Police Department has a Reserve Police Officer program with the ability to employ several reserves to assist in patrol responsibilities. Patrol currently has 3 Sergeants and 10 officers working 8 or 10 hour shifts, with a minimum of two officers on duty 24 hours a day. The patrol division is currently short 2 Police Officers and 1 Community Service Officer due to recent resignations and retirements. The hiring process to fill these vacancies is on going and the positions are expected to be filled at the beginning of March 2008.

Seaside Police Department has 3 detectives assigned to investigations. One detective is responsible for investigations involving child abuse, major crime cases and other assigned follow ups as needed. A second general crimes detective was added this year and just recently assigned to the position. The third detective is assigned to the Clatsop County Interagency Narcotic Taskforce (CCINT) and is responsible for drug related investigations within Seaside and Clatsop County.

The Seaside Police Department continues to stay active in patrol, increasing our total cases taken in 2007 to 8,700, up from 8,639 cases taken in 2006. Patrol made 3,062 traffic stops during 2007. There were approximately 957 total traffic infractions cited, which equates to approximately 31% of the stops resulted in a citation issued. This percentage is probably a little lower because some of the cited drivers receive multiple citations for various infractions.

Training our officers is an on going process that involves a combination of in house and external courses. Approximately 3,462 training hours were logged during 2007 by our officers. 2,560 hours of these total training hours were for four of our newly hired patrol officers attending the 16 week Basic Police Academy, a requirement for becoming a state certified police officer. Some of the other training hours are conducted “in house”, using instructors within our department. Other training courses are outside of our department where officers were sent for specific training topics. Re-occurring training topics often include firearms and use of force, along with frequent briefings related to updated search and seizure decisions.

The City of Seaside hosted several annual events that Seaside Police Department prepares for large crowds. Events requiring extra police presence and preparation included Spring Break, Memorial Day Weekend, 4th of July, Volleyball Tournament and Hood to Coast. These events create unique population floods into our city, increasing our need for extra patrol officers to deal with the anticipated call volume and crowd control situations. Spring break is usually an event where we see dedicated assistance from other agencies, but the

remainder of the large events is staffed using only Seaside Police personnel, requiring a lot of extra work by the department members.

Seaside Police Department personnel have participated in many different community orientated events and some are active members with volunteer organizations. There are three officers of the department that are members of either the Rotary or Kiwanis Clubs and volunteer many hours of their time throughout the year. We also have three members of our department who are volunteer firefighters within Clatsop County.

Our personnel are active with child safety programs, including providing bicycle helmets to needy families. These helmets are donated by different organizations and we are in partnership with Safe Kids, Inc.

Several officers were involved with National Night Out, which was introduced to our community in 2006. During National Night Out the public was invited to two separate park locations for a Bar-B-Q and games for the kids, sponsored by the Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs here in Seaside.

Department members often act as guest speakers for many events, functions and organizations, usually presenting a community policing or crime prevention educational program.

In 2007 we sponsored our first Citizens Academy where several citizens were able to participate in educational training sessions presented by many different law enforcement agencies within our county covering a variety of topics. Some of these Citizen Academy graduates continue to volunteer and assist our department on a regular basis and their help is greatly appreciated.

Patrol division had two veteran officers retire in 2007. Sergeant Ron Onchi retired in July after serving our city for seven years. He had previously been a Tillamook County Deputy before being hired in 2000. In November Corporal Leo Hanthorn retired after serving the citizens of Seaside for over 20 years. Although our patrol division lost two veteran officers to retirement we are excited about our new hires that are eager to work hard and serve the community.

HIGH RISK RESPONSE TEAM (HRRT)

This year the High Risk Response Team had another good year for training. We again worked with the schools, training in December with the Marion County Swat Team at the Seaside Heights Elementary. We also were able to train with Marion County at Camp Rilea.



We were able to work with different Motels/Hotels and train at their location.



We had two successful search warrant entries partnered with the Clatsop County Interagency Narcotics team. One was at Scott Myers residence, which resolved a large neighborhood based complaint. The other was at 418 N Holladay.

INVESTIGATIONS

The Investigation's Unit had another busy year. While no homicides occurred in Seaside during 2007, detectives worked two attempted murder cases. These cases led to a number of arrests and later convictions in court. There have also been a number of sexual assaults that have been reported including a number of cold child sexual abuse cases. These cases too led to arrest, trials and a number of convictions for Measure 11 crimes. Property crimes continue to be of concern and will receive additional attention in 2008 with the addition of a Property Detective late in 2007.

As time allowed, we continued to work cold cases, such as the 1991 Mary Fleming homicide. Recent information has provided new leads which continue to be worked with the assistance of one other member of the Major Crime Team. The 2001 suspicious death of Vicki Davidson also received new leads on a person of interest and we learned this person no longer resides in the United States. His whereabouts have been determined and assistance from the FBI has been requested. Additional leads have been developed in Washington State and Texas as well.

The Major Crime Team continues to work on four other cold cases including two cases involving two missing persons and two fatal hit and run traffic crashes. Those cases remain under investigation. We continue to assist Oregon State Police with the Clatsop County Major Crime Team (CCMCT) on two other cold homicide cases as time allows.

Incidents of child sexual abuse reports continue to be a problem in Seaside as they do throughout the Country. The Lighthouse for Kids, a child assessment center in Astoria, continues to assist in the medical assessment of children and members of the Multiple Disciplinary Team attend a number of assessments monthly. We average about one a month for Seaside. Resources for funding of the Lighthouse Child Assessment Center remains a high priority with a number of new employees on staff, however there continues to be a need for medical volunteers to assist the staff.

Internet crimes are an up and coming problem especially in the area of child sexual abuse and possession of child pornography.

Calls to assist other agencies have decreased with only a handful of Major Crime Team call outs in 2007. We continue to review and work a suspicious death investigation, bank robbery in Gearhart, Warrenton bank robbery, major assaults, and follow-up on kidnaps and rapes.

We look forward to a productive 2008. We plan to attend some specialized training and to provide training at this year's South County Mini Academy. The addition of a second detective will help resolve some of the case load and with ongoing training, improve our investigations.

CLATSOP COUNTY INTERAGENCY NARCOTICS TEAM (CCINT)

CCINT had one of its most productive investigations in years. The county drug team successfully investigated major drug traffickers in methamphetamines, cocaine and marijuana among others. Detectives also joined forces with detectives from other Oregon counties, state and federal agencies to combat narcotics violations here in Clatsop County.

Detectives conducted over 600 hours of surveillance in the City of Seaside and around the county as investigations led throughout Clatsop County. As Detectives pursued possible leads of narcotic violations and possible drug locations, citizens, informants and local patrol officers played a significant role in assisting the investigations. CCINT made over 35 arrests of fugitives during surveillance most of which were drug related warrants. Detectives also conducted twenty six knock and talks of residences where suspected distribution of drugs and drug users were located. This included medical marijuana residences. All stats have increases from the previous year by almost double.

This year detectives made a break through in a major network of drug traffickers distributing methamphetamines and cocaine connected to Mexico. Aided by the Oregon State Police, Sheriff's Office, Warrenton PD, Seaside PD and Astoria PD, CCINT executed three search warrants simultaneously in Astoria that netted over 2 pounds of methamphetamines and cocaine, \$17,500 cash, three vehicles, ten guns and arrested seven illegal immigrants suspected in the multi-state, multi county distribution ring. The investigation revealed documents and information indicating that this was the major source of illegal distribution of narcotics to mid and low level distributors in Clatsop County, including alleged and convicted distributors in years past.

CCINT executed or was involved in 30 search warrants in Clatsop County including 3 federal search warrants in Seaside. Detectives again joined forces with the US Attorney's Office, the Department of Justice, the FBI, DEA, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) as well as state and local agencies in the attempt to prevent illegal distribution of narcotics.

During this year's investigations, CCINT is credited with more than 25 arrests of persons alleged to possess, distribute or manufacture substantial amounts of Methamphetamine, Cocaine and Marijuana. In all, detectives seized or bought approximately 18 ounces of methamphetamine at a street value of \$25,000, 14 ounces of cocaine at a street value of \$23,500, 358 marijuana plants with a street value of approximately \$358,000 from a large grow operation on highway 26, approximately \$20,000 cash, 10 guns, 3 automobiles and 3 computers.

The Drug team will have a new face next year as a long time Clatsop County Deputy Sergeant and supervisor of the drug team has retired and was replaced by another Deputy Sergeant in August. Seaside Police Department has also replaced its detective position due to a recent promotion. The two newest detectives have and will receive extensive training from the Oregon Narcotics Enforcement Association and the Federal, Drug Enforcement Administration over the next several months. Both detectives also received training from another CCINT Detective with over thirty 30 years of experience in which most was spent investigating drugs at a state and local level as well as the federal level.

COMMUNICATIONS

Seaside's Dispatch Center employs 9 full time employees. Support staff personnel (Records and Property) assist dispatch in answering telephone calls and helping lobby traffic. Our service population is approximately 20,000. We primarily dispatch for:

- Seaside, Gearhart, Cannon Beach, and Hamlet Fire Departments
- Seaside, Gearhart, and Cannon Beach Police Departments

As necessary, we dispatch for Oregon State Police, Clatsop County Sheriffs Office, State Forestry, and Coast Guard.

2007 Statistics:

- We answered 6,762 9-1-1 calls and 44,098 non-emergency telephone calls (an overall decrease of 9.7% from last year). NOTE. The 911 count is skewed due to telephone line failure and rerouting of 911 calls during the December Storm.
- We dispatched 9,814 police related calls (a decrease of 1% from last year), and 1,794 fire/medical related calls (an increase of 20% over last year).
- Radio traffic analysis reflected a 10.1% decrease of incoming radio traffic as compared to last year.
- Our receipt of call to dispatch time for fire averages at 75.75 seconds.
- Our receipt of call to dispatch time for police averages at 3.88 minutes.

This past year we:

- Lost two staff members, one full-time and one part-time. All positions filled.
- Worked with a state hired GIS firm to assist Clatsop County in bringing their mapping data current to use with wireless 9-1-1 mapping.
- Modified our Amber Alert plan to include the usage of "A Child is Missing" telephone notification system.
- Equipment acquired for dispatch and the Department included:
 - Generator for Tillamook Head Repeater
- Dispatch and Records Staff community participation included:
 - Foster Parent Program
 - Army National Guard
 - Bicycle Rodeo
 - Astoria Youth Center, "Level 2"
 - Volunteering at Community Fund Raisers
- Dispatch and Records Staff received 217 hours of continuing education (28% increase over last year), plus our new hire's 80 hours of academy training.
- Utilized a citizen's academy graduate for data entry purposes.

- Completed the wireless 9-1-1 mapping project
- Completed Strategic Plan with Objectives
- Participated in Job Fair
- Participated in Citizen's Academy
- Achieved department-wide LEADS certification, and installed LEADS access in the booking room available to all patrol officers.
- Developed and utilized a department intranet for the continuing education purposes.
- Implemented a Communications Quality Assurance Citizen's Survey. Results reflect 94.75 satisfaction rate.
- Dispatch Daily Logs now posted to the police department website (seasidepd.org)

Our 2008 Goals are:

- Continue to pursue COPLINK, web based technology capable to share police related information with neighboring agencies.
- Additional hiring to bring staff levels to full contingency.
- Improve teamwork between communications and patrol.
- Develop and implement an in-house communications mini-academy to accomplish state required training.
- Replacement of our two-position dispatch console: radios and furniture.
- Replacement of our 911/non-emergency telephone system. Funding via state 9-1-1 excise tax.
- Acquisition and training of hardware/software for an emergency telephone notification system. Funding via an emergency preparedness federal appropriation.
- Acquisition and installation of replacement police/fire repeaters for our Tillamook Head radio site. Funding via a Homeland Security Grant award.
- Continue to pursue funding mechanisms for radio infrastructure and interoperability with other cities and counties.
- Update the appearance and operability of the police department website.
- Partner with our County communities, private enterprise, schools and hospitals to ensure our respective Emergency Preparedness Manuals interface effectively.
- Install, train personnel, and regularly test new siren system.
- Continue to pursue Seaside testing of the County E.A.S. (Emergency Announcement System).
- Pursue efficient filing system for archive room.
- Mechanical Room improvements.

EVIDENCE

In the 2007 calendar year, the Seaside Police Department logged in 4328 items of property. This included evidence, found property, safekeeping property, recovered stolen property, and evidence submitted by officers as a result of criminal investigations.

As of January 22, 2008, there were 1,869 items stored and tracked within the inner evidence room. This count does not include safekeeping items or found property, which are stored in separate property areas. The majority of stored evidentiary items are from active 2005, 2006 and 2007 cases.

The department evidence policy was amended to include policy and procedure relating to digital photography, submission, and storage.

New keyless evidence lockers were purchased and installed in the property room. The newly acquired lockers have the capacity to store varied sized items of evidence.

The police department continued to utilize on-line auctioning services to dispose of surplus and unclaimed property. Auctioned items total revenue for the calendar year 2007 was \$883.47.

In 2007, 237 evidentiary items were removed from the inner evidence room and prepared for destruction by incineration.

6 cleared evidentiary firearms were sold to a licensed sporting goods dealer, with the profits utilized to purchase new equipment for patrol. 14 additional items have been prepared for transport to the same dealer.

A multi-agency citizen's academy was conducted. Latent print processing and evidence collection was one of the instructed topics. Students were instructed in basic latent exam and all successfully lifted at least one latent print from a dusted object. Also instructed was basic DNA overview, including collection, comparison, and storage procedures for DNA evidence.

Membership in OPOA (Evidence Sub-chapter) has been maintained allowing information sharing/ networking via email with members in the sub-chapter, training opportunities specializing in evidence, and quarterly meetings to discuss issues relating to the evidence.

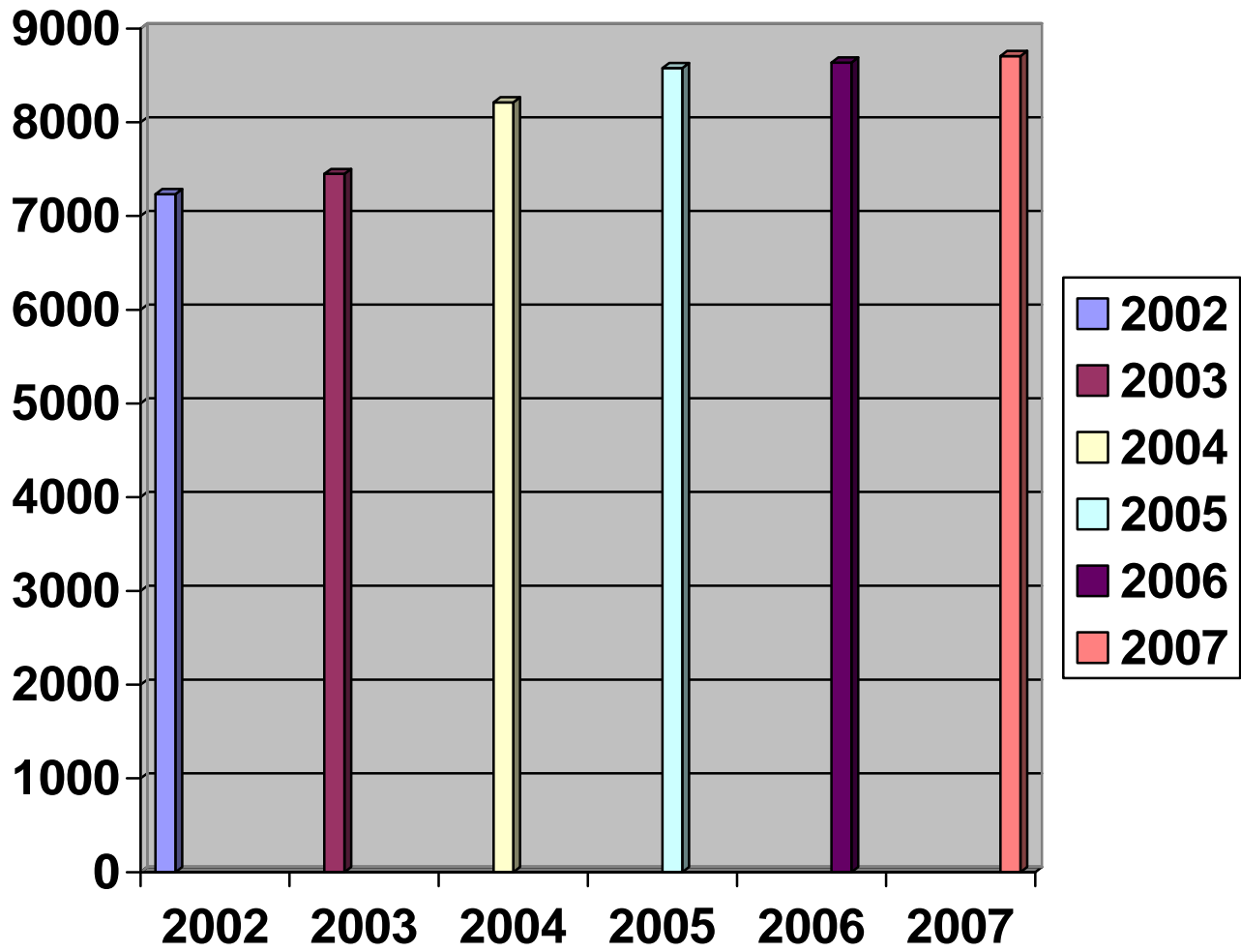

5 YEAR CALLS FOR SERVICE HISTORY

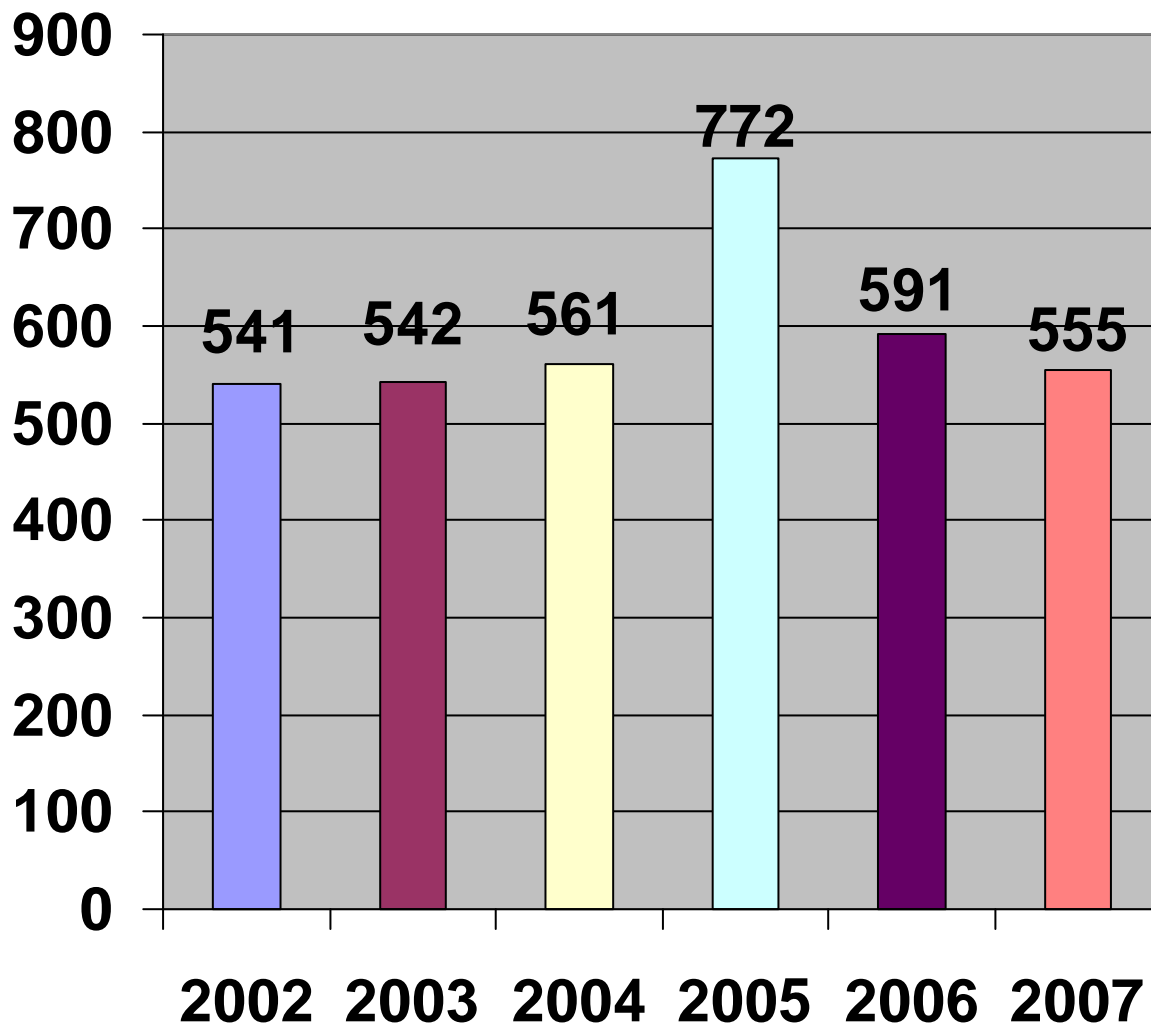

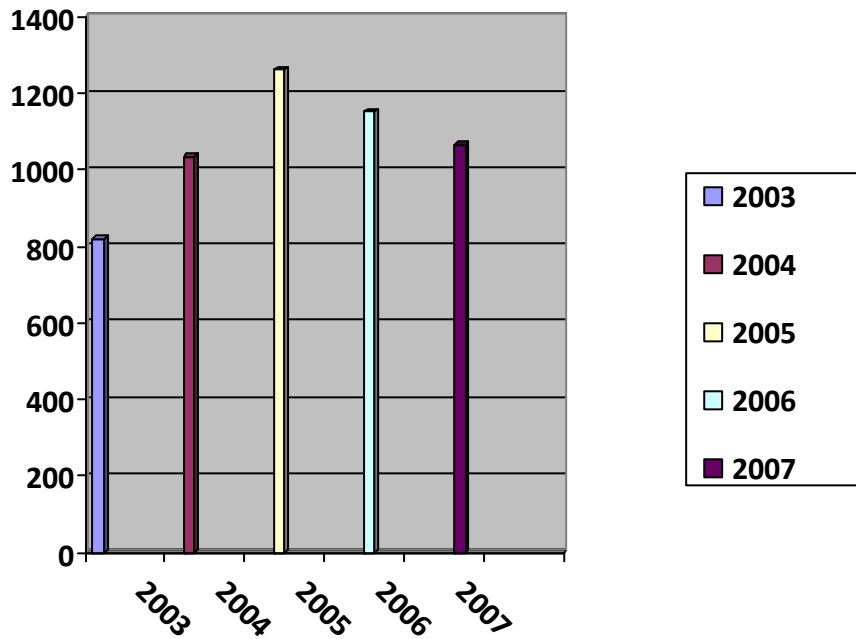

5 YEAR COMPARISON 2002 -2007 PART II OFFENSES



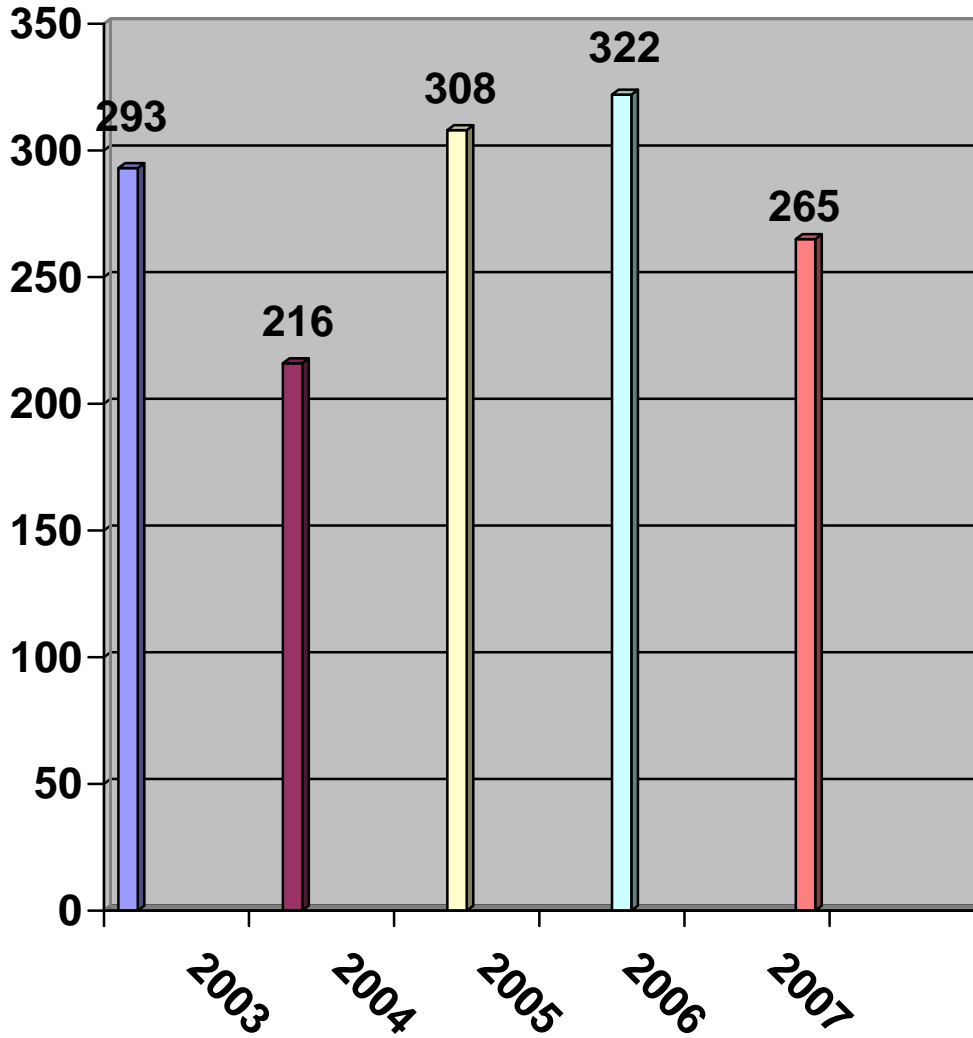

2007 USE OF FORCE REVIEW

There were 55 documented Use of Force incidents during the year.

- **58% occurred after midnight (graveyard shift)**
- **87% involved the use of alcohol and/or drugs by the suspect.**
- **90% were males, 10% were female (57 males & 6 females)**
 - ✓ **In the 55 cases, 63 people were involved**
- **58% involved the use or threatened use of the Taser**
 - ✓ **In 9% of the Taser cases (3) resulted subject being tased**
 - ✓ **One case involved the accidental discharge while preparing for duty**
- **56% involved the use of Physical Force**
- **10% involved drawing the officers weapon**
- **12% resulted in some type of injury to the suspect**
- **5% resulted in some type of injury to the officer**
- **None of the 55 cases resulted in Citizen Complaint**

SOUTH COUNTY CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY



This year we had our 1st South County Citizen's Academy. Citizens were able to learn about what happens behind the scenes in Law Enforcement. Thirteen (13) citizens graduated. They were able to do ridealong with officers, learn about Traffic enforcement, dispatch, administration and budgeting, the court process, tour the jails, shoot firearms, learn about defensive tactics and use of force, and volunteer to be tased.



All the students and instructors had a great time. The only main critique was not enough time for each subject. We were able to gain several excellent volunteers who continue to stay very involved and help out on busy weekends and with training.

We are preparing for this years academy. It will be starting April 22, 2008.
